Class makes memorable field trip

During the meeting, Ban appeared to be very relaxed and unhurried. He spoke to the students about "the three pillars" of the UN — in the distinct areas of Human Rights, Peace and Security, and Development — and observed that the Church's mission often runs parallel to the mission of the U.N.

Ban mentioned that he had met Pope Francis a number of times and he praised the Holy Father's recent encyclical, *Laudato Si: On Care for Our Common Home*, written for all on the care of God's creation. Before leaving, he shook everyone's hand.

The St. Augustine group enjoyed a 15-minute break and a visit to the gift shop before touring the U.N. building in the afternoon.

In addition to entering some of the large conference rooms where international meetings take place, they saw a statue of St. Agnes, which was recovered from a cathedral in Nagasaki, Japan, following the atomic bombing there and the beautiful "Golden Rule" mosaic — a gift to the U.N. from the United States, which is based on a work by American artist Norman Rockwell.
